Morrisville Planning Fiscal Year 2024 Budget, Seeks Community Feedback

The Morrisville Town Council and Town staff are currently in the process of planning next year's budget, and they need your feedback to learn about your needs and priorities. Tell us how you want to see the Town grow.

Throughout March, Town staff provided a number of opportunities for members of the community to give feedback, including through an online survey and in person at events like the Holi Festival and Green Day. Town Council and staff are currently reviewing that feedback and incorporating it into the proposed 2023-24 budget, which will be posted online in early May.

Once the budget is posted, the public will again be invited to provide feedback before it is finalized. Public hearings will be held in which community members can share their thoughts with Town Council directly, and those comments will be taken into consideration to adjust or adopt the proposed budget. Other feedback opportunities will include a budget open house and an interactive informational booth at SpringFest on May 13.

Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony Celebrates Completed Expansion of Morrisville Carpenter Road

The Town of Morrisville celebrated the re-opening of Morrisville Carpenter Road on February 28 after it was expanded from two lanes to four and upgrades were done that will greatly enhance safety for drivers and pedestrians.

In addition to widening the roadway, the Morrisville Carpenter Road improvements included:

- · A landscaped center median
- New sidewalks
- New streetlights
- A new traffic signal at Town Hall Drive with all-way signalized pedestrian crossings
- A new greenway connection from the Indian Creek Greenway to the Hatcher Creek and Crabtree Creek greenways
- Re-construction of 800 feet of Franklin Upchurch Senior Street
- New twin, 100-foot-long box concrete culvert structures at the stream crossing
- Extensive work on stormwater and watermain infrastructure
- Extensive utility relocations, including power, cable, fiber, and gas
- Addition of curbs and gutters

The project also included the construction of a new, illuminated Town Hall monument sign at the corner of Town Hall Drive and Morrisville Carpenter Road.

The total project cost was more than \$10 million. Funding was provided in partnership with the N.C. Department of Transportation (NCDOT), which provided about 70 percent of the funding, while the Town of Morrisville financed the remaining amount.

The Town is working with the NCDOT on right-of-way acquisition and easements for a new traffic signal with all-way signalized pedestrian crossings at Old Savannah Drive/Oriana Drive and Morrisville Carpenter Road and also for a permanent high-intensity, pedestrian-activated crosswalk signal between Ranglin Street and Leafycreek Drive. These new signals will enhance vehicular and pedestrian safety at both locations and is a collaboration between the community, the NCDOT, and the Town.

Morrisville's Focus on Grants

In late summer 2022, the Town of Morrisville established an internal staff team with a grants focus. The team works in partnership and collaboration with the Triangle J Council of Governments (TJCOG). Through this partnership, the staff team has gained access to additional grant resources, including research, grant writing, and community and regional partner grant interest. The team meets regularly to review and vet grant opportunities, which are prioritized using focus areas aligned with Town Council, organizational, and community-identified interests.

To continue expanding and enhancing its knowledge so that it can assist in developing future funding applications, the grants team is participating in the National League of Cities Bootcamp focused on the "Charging and Fueling Infrastructure" program within the Energy Efficiency Community Block grant.

In December, the Town received its largest award of Fiscal Year 2023, in the amount of \$250,000 for the Golden Leaf Foundation Flood Mitigation Program Grant. The program targets projects that effectively mitigate against existing or future flooding by constructing infrastructure solutions that benefit residents and the community. The grant awarded to Morrisville was a no-match grant for the Wolfsnare Lane Culvert. The culvert was prioritized high as an area of concern in the approved Stormwater Master Plan and was included in the Town's Stormwater CIP. The project takes aim at reducing flooding in the area by upsizing a culvert and reworking a swale near the intersection of Wolfsnare Lane and Crabtree Crossing Parkway. The project was the only one in Wake County that received an award from the program.

In February, staff received notice that Morrisville received the first grant for which it applied - \$65,000 in a U.S. Department of Transportation Safe Streets for All grant to develop a "Vision Zero" plan. This plan will address road safety concerns with the goal of zero fatalities or serious injuries on Morrisville roads. Being awarded this grant also makes the Town eligible to apply for future phases of funding under this program.

Grants may be federally, state, or regionally issued. Depending on the format, if funds are awarded, grants can allow additional flexibility to use existing appropriations for other high-priority projects. Staff remains committed to finding the most effective and efficient ways to utilize Town funds and to being good stewards to the community.

To date, the Town has received awards totaling \$1,016,000 for Fiscal Year 2023.

Lozinsky Sworn in as Morrisville Fire Chief



Nathan Lozinsky was sworn in as the Town's new fire chief on Feb. 7. Lozinsky, formerly the Town's deputy fire chief, was named the new chief on Dec. 31. Lozinsky succeeded Scott Criddle, who served as the Town's fire chief since November 2018.

"I am honored to serve the Town of Morrisville residents, businesses and visitors as the fire chief," said Chief Lozinsky. "I am excited about the opportunity to continue to build off the progressive foundation Chief Criddle cultivated and further lead an already excellent fire department forward."

Chief Lozinsky is a 16-year fire service veteran, serving his entire career with the Town of Morrisville. He has held every rank in the Morrisville Fire/Rescue Department, from firefighter to deputy fire chief.

The Oath of Office was administered to Chief Lozinsky by Town Clerk Eric Smith.

Morrisville Involved in Language Access Collaborative Program

The Town of Morrisville is a participant in the Local Government Language Access Collaborative, a one-year interactive course designed to build capacity for North Carolina local governments to communicate with residents in community languages. The Language Access Collaborative builds relationships between local governments and community partners, who must come together as a team to design a language access plan for their city, town or county. Morrisville is joined in its efforts by Hindi Vikas Mandal (HVM), a community organization who is a part of the Hindu Society of North Carolina (HSNC).

Monthly activities began in January 2023 and will take place until January 2024. The program features seven virtual workshops and two in-person events in Chapel Hill. Following the completion of the course, which is administered by Building Integrated Communities (BIC), the local government teams will be eligible for funding to assist with the implementation of their language access plan.

MAFC Offering Several Programs this Spring

The Cary Pickleball Ambassadors host a **free pickleball clinic** for beginners on the second Sunday of each month at the MAFC from 11 a.m.-1 p.m., providing a great opportunity for those who are looking for a broad introduction to the game.

Racquetball Community Play takes place on the third Sunday of each month at the MAFC from 2:30-4:30 p.m. All levels are encouraged, and matches can be played as singles or doubles. This is a free event to MAFC members and available to non-members with the purchase of a single visit pass.
