Morrisville Moves to COVID-19 Phase 3

On October 2, the Town of Morrisville transitioned to Phase 3 of its plan to ease COVID-19 restrictions. The Town of Morrisville is requiring face coverings anytime a Town employee interacts with the public; members of the public will also be required to wear a face covering when visiting a Town building (recognizing exceptions as outlined in Executive Order 169).

Morrisville Aquatics & Fitness Center Opens

The newly renovated Morrisville Aquatics & Fitness Center (MAFC) reopened August 31 with significantly enhanced amenities in the center and with greater capacity for participation.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on September 8, attended by the Morrisville Town Council, Town Administrative and Communications staff, and the Parks, Recreation & Cultural Resources staff and Advisory Committee to commemorate the re-opening, renovation, and expanded services now offered by the facility. - Three new swimming areas (six-lane lap pool, recreation pool, and a zero-depth entry wading pool with a kid's play structure) covered by a glass natatorium with a retractable roof
- Two new outdoor lighted tennis courts for early morning or evening play
- An updated group fitness area and new sound system
- A new TRX station
- · A new weight room
- Updated strength and cardio equipment
- · Updated locker rooms and bathrooms
- Updated racquetball courts

Group fitness classes in the fitness studio and the pool at MAFC have resumed and require appointment sign-up.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all MAFC classes and exercise areas have limited capacity and require registration through Signup Genius. Outdoor fitness classes are still available by sign-up.

Morrisville Carpenter Road Improvement Project



The upcoming Morrisville Carpenter Road improvement project includes improvements from Davis Drive to just west of Chapel Hill Road (NC 54). The improvements include new pavement and a landscape median installation from Davis Drive to Old Savannah Drive and widening to a fourlane landscape median divided roadway from Old Savannah Drive to just west of NC 54.

This project will also include the widening of Town Hall Drive (near the Morrisville Carpenter Road intersection) and realignment of Franklin Upchurch Street. Construction will also include stormwater/drainage improvements, traffic signal improvements, utility relocations, streetlights, and sidewalks throughout the corridor.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic and its impact on state funding, the project was put on hold in May of 2020 by the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT). The Town received authorization from NCDOT to proceed with the project in late August. This project is partially funded by federal and state funds through a grant from NCDOT.

Residents, visitors, and business owners should expect to see construction activities starting in January of 2021. The project is estimated to take 18 months and is expected to be completed in the summer of 2022.

Town staff provided project informational updates to area HOAs on October 20, 21, and 22. The Town will also be providing regular construction updates via the Town's website, social media, and site construction signage.

New Parks, Recreation, & Cultural Resources Amenities

Throughout 2020, Morrisville's Parks, Recreation, & Cultural Resources have been involved in improvement projects to add amenities to the parks and greenways.



Morrisville Community Park, Church Street Park, Shiloh Park, and Northwest Park all now have a variety of smaller concrete park amenities including cornhole boards, chess tables, and a concrete tennis table.





Church Street Park now has a fitness shelter located next to shelter B with a variety of equipment targeting the upper body, lower body, and core exercises.



Morrisville Community Park now has a larger shaded fitness station with individual exercise pieces by the playground.





At **Indian Creek Trailhead**, ADA accessible playground equipment was added, including musical instruments, spinners, and a seated seesaw. **Dedicated to Our Community of North Carolina (DOCNC)**, a local youth group, donated \$15,000 to help purchase and install this equipment.



At **Cedar Fork District Park**, a concrete parking pad was installed to improve the ADA accessible parking lot.



Morrisville Community Park now has pervious concrete sidewalks designed to improve ADA access.

Connect Morrisville Strategic Plan

Morrisville's first-ever strategic plan, Connect Morrisville, was adopted by Town Council in April 2018. As a three-year plan, 2020 would typically be the start of the organizational review period. Town Council received a plan update and reviewed the next steps for a proposed plan revision timeline during a work session on October 27.

Citizen engagement is a key component of any successful plan, and with the COVID-19 pandemic limiting in-person engagement, Town staff utilized several remote and contact-less tools that will allow Morrisville staff, elected officials, and citizens to provide input safely and effectively. We look forward to your engagement and participation over the next several months!

Virtual Morrisville

Advisory Boards and Committees

In compliance with Governor Cooper's Executive Orders related to COVID-19, Morrisville staff have implemented resources to allow elected officials and appointed committees to meet virtually to safely continue advancing the work of the Town.

Virtual meetings are hosted in Microsoft Teams and streamed live on the Town's Facebook page. Meeting recordings are linked to the Town Council video page on the Town's website, and advisory boards and committees have a folder of meeting videos on the Town's Facebook page.

This coordination was executed in conjunction with many Town departments to ensure its success. We are thankful for all our board and committee members and their support of the virtual meeting initiative.

The virtual meeting platform remains compliant with North Carolina Open Meetings Law and offers a transparent discussion of Town business. Additionally, amendments were required to the Appointed Public Bodies Administrative Policy (guiding document) to allow for remote meeting participation.

Crabtree Creek Greenway Railroad Underpass Now Open



Crabtree Creek Greenway NC Railroad Underpass

The last section of Crabtree Creek Greenway has been completed, with an underpass running below NC-54 and the North Carolina Railroad bridge and by Crabtree Creek. This section is now open to the public, allowing for unrestricted pedestrian and bicycle passage from Davis Drive to Evans Road and Lake Crabtree. This greenway underpass provides a much-needed east-west greenway corridor through Morrisville connecting to Lake Crabtree to the east and the Town of Cary's greenway system to the west.

The North Carolina Railroad project contractor responsible for the Crabtree Creek Bridge replacement completed the missing portion of the greenway between Crabtree Creek Greenway and Hatcher Creek Greenway. The greenway project was completed in August 2018, excluding the missing greenway portion under the North Carolina Railroad.

Morrisville's trash and recycling are completed by our contractor, Waste Industries, who utilizes their transfer site in Durham to offer the Town pickup services on holidays when other municipalities are closed.

Durham Waste Industries only recognizes three holidays that affect service: Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

Normal trash and recycling service on Wednesday, November 11.

Thanksgiving Holiday

No trash or recycling service on Thursday, November 26. Thursday pickup routes moved to Friday, November 27. Friday pickup routes moved to Saturday, November 27.

Christmas Day

No trash or recycling service on Friday, December 25. Friday pickup routes moved to Saturday, December 26.

New Year's Day

No trash or recycling service on Friday, January 1. Friday pickup routes moved to Saturday, January 2.

Open Data is coming to Morrisville!

Open data is data and datasets that are freely available to the public, and can be used, reused, and redistributed by anyone. In the fall of 2020, the Town of Morrisville will venture into the open data realm with the launch of our open data portal. The purpose of the open data portal is to increase government transparency by facilitating public access to local government information. With the new web-based tool, users will be able to create graphs, charts, and maps based on the dataset(s), as well as download the dataset(s), interact with it, reuse it, and redistribute it. Datasets will be organized under the headings of Administration, Environment, Planning and Permits, Public Safety, Recreation and Transportation. The initial open data portal launch will include a handful of datasets with more datasets coming online at regular intervals.

Introducing Smart Morrisville!

The Town of Morrisville has recently developed Smart Morrisville, a smart city program guided by the strategic direction and goals of Morrisville that uses technology and data to improve operational efficiencies and positively impact citizen quality of life. The vision of the program is to create sustainable, community-driven, technology-enabled innovation to enhance the quality of life in Morrisville today, and in the future. The Program will be incorporated into several initiatives that the Town will be working to implement. The complete plan will be released on our Town's website over the next few weeks.

Did You Know?

Did you know that a building permit may be required for modifications or additions that you want to make to your home? Often homeowners contact the Morrisville Permit Department during the sale of a home when it is discovered that work may have been completed without permits. Unpermitted work can be costly and time consuming for a homeowner to rectify. The following is a partial list of work done to your home that would require a building permit:

- Adding or extending a deck
- Building a screened porch or a sunroom
- Finishing a basement or attic that was previously unfinished
- Erecting a shed or other accessory structure that extends more than 12' in any direction
- Modification, alteration, or extension to electrical, plumbing, or mechanical systems
